AR PL New Kai (odokai.ttf from opendesktop-fonts-1.4.2)

This Chinese Serif font supports English, and Simplified Chinese. The Cyrillic glyphs are too widely-spaced and the Greek glyphs are similarly spaced, oblique, and omit iota with diaeresis.

There is also an odokai-ExtB font which only covers basic latin (ASCII) and one CJK Extension B glyph, U+28468.

Kai is a 'regular' or 'official' style, typically used for official documents.

This has a few accented Latin letters needed to show the tones in Pinyin (汉语拼音方案 in Simplified).

For languages not using the Latin, Cyrillic, or monotonic Greek alphabets I merely display the digits if not common 0..9, and Article 1 of the UDHR (that is traditional!).

### 2 Quotation-marks, etc.

In real-world usage, particularly when looking at news sites, the presence or absence of the correct quote characters will make a difference. As a coder, I use '...' or "..." but in good text there are variations and this font supports:

In Spanish languages, the inverted exclamation-mark i and inverted question-mark  $\dot{i}$  are necessary.
